# Protect Progress. Fund Diabetes Programs.

Federal programs across the NIH and CDC are essential to Arizona's fight against diabetes. Cuts threaten the research, prevention, and infrastructure supporting the 731,900 adults in Arizona living with diabetes.<sup>1</sup>

## **NIDDK** National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive & Kidney Diseases Current Funding: \$13.4M

- The NIDDK currently funds 30 projects across Arizona, with \$3.8M committed to diabetes-related research in 2024 alone.<sup>1,2</sup>
- The NIDDK supports 5 active clinical trials.<sup>3</sup>
- Cuts would threaten this nationwide research engine that advances care and improves health outcomes for over 730,000 Arizonans.

## **DNPAO** CDC Division of Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Obesity FY 2024 Funding: \$1.5M

- Cuts would affect \$1.5M working to reduce the risk of chronic conditions through nutrition access, physical activity infrastructure, and obesity prevention:
  - \$880,000 to the Arizona Department of Health Services for the State Physical Activity and Nutrition (SPAN) Program.
  - \$680,038 to Prima County Health Department for Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) Program.<sup>4</sup>

### Expanding Nutrition Access

through fruit and vegetable incentive programs and healthier worksite food practices.

Promoting Early Health with farm-to-school programs, provider education, and breastfeeding support.

#### **Encouraging Active Lifestyles** by developing community programs that promote physical activity in the workplace.<sup>5</sup>

# **National DPP**

CDC National Diabetes Prevention Program Current Funding: \$1.1M<sup>6</sup>


- National DPP supports diabetes prevention programs for over 10,000 enrollees offered by 25 organizations across 15 cities.<sup>7,8</sup>
- Cuts would disrupt access to evidence-based lifestyle interventions shown to reduce the risk of type 2 diabetes by 58% in adults and 71% among seniors.<sup>9</sup>

# DDT

### CDC Division of Diabetes Translation Current Funding: \$1.7M

 Cuts would threaten \$1.7M that supports the Arizona Department of Health Services in tracking, preventing, and managing diabetes.<sup>7</sup> **34** Diabetes Self-Management Education and Support (DSMES) service providers.

**20,452** Arizonans with diabetes that have used DDT DSMES.
